DID YOU KNOW? Parish Trivia

The Amite River is a tributary of Lake Maurepas. It is about 100 miles long. It starts as two forks in southwestern Mississippi and flows south through Louisiana, passing through Livingston Parish to Lake Maurepas. The lower 37 miles of the river is navigable. A portion of the river is diverted via the Petite Amite River and Amite Diversion Canal to the Blind River, which also flows



to Lake Maurepas. The name Amite is supposed to have come from the word *amitie* which in French means "friendship." In a report of Iverville, dated July, 1699: It was on this occasion that he gave names to the lakes and streams they still bear, Amite in token of the friendly reception he had from the Houma Indians.
